Groundworks Hertfordshire Ltd have now completed their phase of the project, and local builders Richardsons have started their work on the structure.

Our grateful thanks again go to all the willing helpers who have attended working days, and adhoc 'help' days. Without their efforts it would have been impossible to achieve so much.

The garden has been planted with over 200 shrubs and trees, and the new lawn is growing well in all the rain.

The 120 'edible hedge' plants were planted in just a few hours and we're looking forward to the fruits of our labours next year.

The 'lamp hut' has been restored next to the signal box (it can be seen in the photo on the website taken in 1974 between the signal and the box). It will be used for storage, but no paraffin lamps as they pose a fire hazard!

#### Builders

Groundworks Hertfordshire Ltd. were appointed to level the gardens, dig up the concrete, lay the paths, replace the fence, and open the road access. They have also shored up the embankment with railway sleepers and built the disabled access ramp. This work is now completed to a high standard – all on time and within budget. Local builders, Richardsons of Sleapshyde, have now started on the box itself. Network Rail have approved the work and preliminary foundation excavations started. Some of the rotten wood has already been replaced.

#### Heritage Open Days

Roses - of lime juice fame - had a franchise to bottle and distribute Dubonnet in the UK. Their plant in Grosvenor Road, St Albans, had no dedicated rail connection, but happened to back on to the down carriage sidings at the south end of the station on the Midland Main Line. Once the coaches stabled overnight had been taken out for

the day's duties, the tank wagon was shunted to the end of the siding nearest the works and emptied into the bottling factory by a flexible pipe. It presumably had to be removed before the coaches returned to the siding for the night, and the photo shows 'Jinty' 47261 pulling the empty wagon out of the siding, past St Albans South signal box.
